The following criteria are recommended for monitoring the student's performance in the course:

a) To get a grade of 5 (excellent), a student's knowledge level must meet the following criteria:

- > Clearly and comprehensively explain the essence and content of the subject.
- ➤ Maintain scientific accuracy and logical consistency when presenting topics, avoiding errors and misunderstandings.
- ➤ Have a precise understanding of the theoretical and practical significance of the subject matter.
 - ➤ Demonstrate independent and critical thinking within the subject area.
 - ➤ Provide clear and concise answers to questions.
 - ➤ Be well-prepared with detailed and thorough notes.
 - Complete independent assignments accurately and in full.
 - Fully grasp the laws and regulatory documents related to the subject.
 - ➤ Publish a scientific article on one of the subject's topics.
 - > Be able to analyze and interpret historical processes;

b) A student must meet the following requirements to get a Grade 4 (Good):

- ➤ Have a clear understanding of the essence and content of the subject, presenting topics without scientific or logical errors.
 - > Comprehend the practical significance of the subject.
- > Successfully complete assigned tasks and exercises within the curriculum framework.
 - ➤ Provide correct answers to subject-related questions.
 - ➤ Maintain well-structured and thorough notes.
 - Fully complete independent assignments.
- ➤ Demonstrate knowledge of relevant laws and regulatory documents related to the subject.

v) A student must meet the following requirements to get a Grade 3 (Satisfactory):

- ➤ Have a general understanding of the subject.
- > Present topics in a limited scope with some inconsistencies or confusion.
- Lack of fluency in explanations.
- ➤ Provide vague or unclear answers to subject-related questions.
- ➤ Have incomplete or poorly structured notes.

g) A student's performance is considered unsatisfactory (Grade 2) in the following cases:

- ➤ Lack of preparation for lessons.
- ➤ No understanding of the subject matter.
- Plagiarism or copying of texts from others is detected.
- > Serious errors and confusion in written work.

- ➤ Inability to answer subject-related questions.
- Complete lack of knowledge in the subject.

The midterm assessment and the evaluation of a student's knowledge for this type of assessment are carried out by the professor who conducted the relevant course sessions.

The final assessment and the evaluation of a student's knowledge for this type of assessment are carried out by a professor who did not conduct the course sessions. The professor who conducted the course sessions does not participate in the final assessment.

A student must complete the midterm assessment before the date of the final assessment for the relevant course.

A student who has missed 25% or more of the allocated classroom hours for a course without a tangible reason, or who did not take the midterm assessment, or who received an "unsatisfactory" grade (2) for this assessment, is disqualified from the course and not admitted to the final assessment. Consequently, the student is considered not to have earned the corresponding credits for the course.

A student who is not admitted to the final assessment fails to attend it, or receives an unsatisfactory grade for the final assessment is considered academically indebted.

Academically indebted students have the right to retake the failed courses during the holiday period or in subsequent semesters at their own expense. This is allowed after paying the required fee, which is calculated based on the amount of unearned credits and the base tuition fee.

Requirements for Obtaining Credits:

Fully mastering theoretical and methodological concepts related to the subject, accurately reflecting analysis results, and independently reasoning about the studied historical processes, specifically, for each seminar:

- Presenting personal reflections in written form within the framework of the case study method;
 - Preparing a presentation on the given topic;
 - Creating a test to reinforce the covered material;
- Keeping seminar notebooks (summary of seminar topics, review of literature related to the seminar, biographical insights into historical figures covered in the topic), completing tasks and assignments in current and midterm assessments, and submitting written work for the final assessment.
