meeting №1 on August 30, 2025

Attendance: 30 out of 35 Council members present

The Chairperson of the University Council noted the presence of a quorum and declared the meeting open.

G. Sh. Rikhsiyeva, Chairperson of the Council of Tashkent State University of Oriental Studies (TSUOS), addressed the assembly, warmly congratulating the university staff on the 34th anniversary of Independence. In honor of the holiday, several professors, teachers, and staff members were presented with gifts by the University Trade Union.

Following this, the agenda was introduced. It was noted that Council members were already familiar with the issues included; the agenda was subsequently approved, and the meeting commenced.

HEARD:

Speakers: Rector and Vice-Rectors Subject: On the important tasks in spiritual-educational, educational-methodological, and scientific-research areas facing the TSUOS staff in the 2025/2026 academic year

Rector G. Rikhsiyeva, Chairperson of the TSUOS Council, noted that since the 2024/2025 academic year, the university has operated under a new structure based on the experience of the world's Top-300 universities. Efforts have focused on aligning with international rating agencies (QS and THE), integrating science and industry, implementing smart campus management, and promoting person-centered education. She emphasized that the previous year was a successful trial period that will be further refined.

Key Strategic Points:

- **Oriental Studies Concept:** New reforms were implemented based on a modern Oriental Studies concept tailored for the "New Uzbekistan," involving students and doctoral candidates directly.
- **Mentor-Mentee System:** Priority is placed on enhancing the traditional "ustoz-shogird" system to raise mature specialists.
- **Internationalization:** The university successfully held international conferences and increased scientific defenses (35 defenses in the 2024/2025 year).
- **Employment:** Faculty and management are responsible for student employment and expanding internship opportunities.
- **Values:** Every staff member is responsible for maintaining the university's image and fostering national values.

HEARD:

Speaker: Qudratilla Omonov, the first Vice-rector for youth affairs and spiritual and educational affairs.

First Vice-Rector for Youth Affairs and Spiritual-Educational Work, K. Omonov, spoke regarding the priority tasks for 2025/2026 in improving youth work, the educational system, health lifestyles, and meaningful leisure time for students.

Eight priority areas have been established for the 2025/2026 academic year to bring youth work to a new qualitative level:

1. Educating students in the spirit of respect for universal and national values.
2. Widespread implementation of the "5 Important Initiatives" proposed by the President of the Republic of Uzbekistan.
3. Effective organization of work related to the "Alley of Writers."
4. Activities aimed at establishing cooperation with parents, state/public organizations, and local neighborhoods (mahallah).
5. Explaining the essence of complex global geopolitical and ideological processes and conducting an effective ideological struggle against various threats.
6. Working with students on social networks and electronic platforms.
7. Social protection of students, providing material and moral incentives.

8. Promotional activities to convey the essence of socio-political and economic reforms and adopted legislation to students and faculty.

HEARD:

Speaker: Abdullaev Nodir

On this matter, Vice-Rector for Academic Affairs N. Abdullayev delivered a speech on the activities carried out at Tashkent State University of Oriental Studies in the 2025/2026 academic year within the framework of academic development, international cooperation, and rankings.

It was particularly emphasized that, in order to ensure the full and effective implementation of the tasks set for 2025/2026 under the “Target Program” developed for 18 higher education institutions selected for entry into the QS and THE international rankings by 2026, it is essential to deepen cooperation with international ranking organizations. In this regard, it is planned to establish contracts and carry out practical activities with international ranking agencies such as QS, THE, RUR, WURI, and GreenMetrics.

Furthermore, increasing the number of respondents participating in the “Academic Reputation” and “Employer Reputation” surveys at both international and national levels to 1,000, as well as expanding geographical coverage to 50 countries, and raising the number of United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) addressed by the university to 11 were highlighted as urgent and priority tasks.

In addition, the following activities are planned in the field of international cooperation for the 2025/2026 academic year:

- Sending 50 TSUOS students to foreign higher education institutions for short- and long-term academic programs based on intergovernmental and inter-university agreements;
- Sending 50 TSUOS professors, teachers, and staff abroad to participate in international educational and scientific-practical exhibitions, fairs, as well as forums, conferences, and symposiums held at foreign higher education institutions;
- Engaging 30 qualified foreign professors and lecturers in the educational process at TSUOS on both short- and long-term bases;
- Increasing the number of international students studying at TSUOS to 100;
- Accepting 10 students from partner foreign higher education institutions within the framework of academic mobility programs;
- Signing cooperation agreements with foreign higher education institutions and educational organizations;
- Inviting qualified representatives of diplomatic missions accredited in the Republic of Uzbekistan and international organizations to deliver lectures and conduct practical sessions at the university, including organizing online distance classes with their participation;
- Organizing short-term summer schools on Uzbek language and culture for international students;

- Organizing meetings of the TSUOS Rector with foreign ambassadors and other guests, as well as arranging visits of foreign delegations of various levels to the university in coordination with relevant authorities.

Moreover, within the academic domain for the 2025/2026 academic year, the following strategic objectives are planned:

- Preparing for the introduction of distance education in 7 fields of study (history, philosophy, international relations, economics, psychology, journalism, and management) based on international best practices. This includes establishing a working group of qualified university specialists to explore opportunities for distance education, developing video and multimedia content, and creating a platform on the university website for hosting educational materials;

- Enhancing the qualifications of academic staff through training courses at partner foreign universities, taking into account modern trends. In this regard, negotiations are planned with prestigious higher education institutions in Turkey, China, Korea, and Oman, aiming to improve not only the qualifications of academic staff but also administrative personnel;

- Advancing the quality of education to a new level and training highly qualified specialists proficient in Eastern languages by widely integrating artificial intelligence into teaching processes, including virtual and interactive learning formats. It is planned to study international best practices in AI integration and introduce AI-based adaptive learning platforms at the university based on the experience of leading foreign institutions.

Chairperson: It was particularly emphasized that ensuring the participation of leading foreign professors in both long- and short-term teaching at the university, facilitating the involvement of university staff and students in international forums, conferences, and symposiums, and promoting participation in prestigious international educational and scientific exhibitions, fairs, and research projects are key factors in improving the university's ranking.

HEARD:

Speaker: Sayfullaev Durbek

On this matter, Vice-rector for scientific affairs and innovations D. Sayfullaev delivered a speech, outlining that within the framework of the transformation and internationalization strategy of Tashkent State University of Oriental Studies, it is planned to increase the effectiveness of scientific research outcomes and the scientific capacity indicator to 55% during the 2025–2026 academic year.

To achieve this, it is envisaged to organize chapter-by-chapter discussions of researchers' scientific works at the university's higher schools and departments, develop international and local research projects, and actively participate in competitive grant programs. In collaboration with compatriot scholars, special emphasis will be placed on developing research projects in the field of science under the theme *“Evolution and Transformation of National Identity in Eastern Countries.”*

These projects will focus on studying the formation, development, and transformation processes of national identity in countries with diverse civilizational environments in the Eastern region, including Egypt, Pakistan, Iran, Afghanistan, China, and the Republic of Korea. The research will aim to propose theoretical and practical solutions that contribute to preserving and strengthening national identity, as well as ensuring civilizational stability. These outcomes are intended for application in national policies, educational reforms, and cultural strategies, while also fostering a comprehensive approach to addressing contemporary challenges that threaten national identity.

In addition, it is planned to expand the scope of research productivity among faculty members by increasing the number of professors with an h-index of 5+ in *Scopus* and *Web of Science* databases through the publication of high-quality scientific articles. Measures will also be taken to improve and internationalize the university's scientific journals, including conducting technical and methodological preparations to index them in international databases such as E-Library, InLibrary, DOAJ, and ERIH PLUS.

Furthermore, it is planned to publish information about tourist sites affiliated with the university and content in Eastern languages on the world's top 10 most popular online platforms. Efforts will also be made to enhance the reputation of national and international conferences held at the university through active promotion on global academic networks and platforms. Information about university conferences will be published on platforms such as Academia.edu, ResearchGate, LinkedIn Academic, Elsevier Events, and Springer Events to attract the attention of the international academic community.

Special attention will also be given to publishing articles related to all 17 **Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)** in journals indexed in *Scopus* and *Web of Science*. Additionally, efforts will focus on enhancing the intellectual potential of youth, encouraging their scientific activities, and ensuring достойное participation of students in national science Olympiads and startup competitions.

It is also planned to improve postgraduate education based on international best practices, involve foreign professors and researchers as members of scientific councils and official opponents, select leading foreign higher education institutions as partner organizations, and send university researchers for international scientific internships.

It was emphasized that, in order to ensure the timely and high-quality implementation of these tasks, it is essential to effectively utilize the scientific potential of university faculty, as well as invited foreign professors from partner institutions, and to work closely with undergraduate, master's, and doctoral students.

Chairperson: It was highlighted that it is necessary to implement fundamental, applied, and innovative projects within the framework of state scientific and

technical programs at higher schools and departments, assign students to experienced professors under the mentor-mentee (ustoz-shogird) system, expand the participation of talented youth, develop startup projects, and organize cooperation with officials from the Ministry of Higher Education, Science, and Innovation. Furthermore, organizing meetings with representatives of foreign higher education institutions, international organizations, and diplomatic missions, as well as expanding cooperation in the scientific field, was emphasized as an important priority.

HEARD:

Speaker: Mirziyatov Shuhrat

1. On this matter, Vice-Rector for Finance and Economic Affairs Sh. Mirziyatov emphasized that the current condition of academic buildings and the following tasks are planned for the 2025/2026 academic year:

2. Conducting inspections of buildings to prepare them for the 2025–2026 academic year, eliminating identified deficiencies, carrying out minor repairs of classrooms requiring maintenance, checking the condition of educational equipment, and addressing all detected shortcomings;

3. In cooperation with the Mirabad District Administration, organizing the planting of 300 ornamental and fruit trees in designated areas during the autumn season within the framework of the nationwide “Green Space” initiative; cleaning and conducting preventive maintenance of modern boiler house chimneys; flushing the heating systems of buildings connected to the city heating network and installing regulating devices;

4. Organizing a tender among entrepreneurs for the construction of a 600-bed student dormitory planned to be built on the university campus under a public-private partnership (PPP) scheme; thoroughly reviewing the documents submitted by bidders, selecting the winner, and signing the final agreement;

5. Ensuring the continuous maintenance of greenery on campus by regularly treating perennial trees and shrubs against pests and providing proper care;

6. Installing motion sensor devices in building corridors to reduce electricity consumption;

7. Carrying out landscaping works, including planting ornamental trees and flowers during the spring season to improve the university environment.

8. It was also noted that, in order to effectively organize the 2025/2026 academic year, university buildings, departments, faculty offices, and classrooms have been fully equipped with all necessary materials and equipment.

Chairperson: It was emphasized that special attention has been given to ensuring that university buildings are fully prepared for the educational process, providing all necessary teaching equipment, and maintaining comfortable conditions during both hot and cold weather, so that classes can be conducted on time and in

accordance with modern standards. It was also highlighted that the timely fulfillment of financial responsibilities is a key requirement of the present day.

Based on the above considerations

DECIDES:

1. The annual report on activities related to youth affairs, educational and moral development, and the social environment for the 2024/2025 academic year shall be approved as a basis, and the university's performance in these areas shall be considered satisfactory;

2. The report on academic activities, strengthening international education integration, international cooperation, and rankings for the 2024/2025 academic year shall be accepted for information, and the performance shall be considered satisfactory;

3. The report on scientific and innovation activities, including research outcomes for the 2024/2025 academic year, shall be approved, and the performance shall be considered satisfactory;

4. The report on financial and economic activities for the 2024/2025 academic year shall be approved, and the performance shall be considered satisfactory;

5. The implementation of tasks set out in the university's "Roadmap" across all areas shall be monitored to ensure full completion of the targeted indicators by the end of 2025. Responsible: Vice-Rectors.

HEARD:

Speaker: *Q. Omonov*

2. Provision of accommodation for students of Tashkent State University of Oriental Studies, including placement in rented housing.

On this matter, the first Vice-rector for youth affairs and spiritual and educational affairs Q. Omonov delivered a speech:

A number of measures have been implemented at Tashkent State University of Oriental Studies to systematically organize the preparation of student dormitories and the accommodation of students planned to study in the 2025–2026 academic year.

A center for assisting students in placement in dormitories and rented housing, as well as a volunteer group, has been established to help students find affordable rental housing. In addition, a team of responsible staff has been formed to work with the information system for providing student accommodation. At the entrance of the university's main building, assistance centers and an information kiosk have been set up to support the placement of students in dormitories.

The university's state dormitory building was constructed in 1966, and its last major renovation was carried out in 2002. Since then, no major repairs have been undertaken. Based on the recommendation of the sanitary-epidemiological department of Mirzo Ulugbek district, it has been advised not to accommodate

students in the dormitory for this academic year and instead to carry out major renovation works. Therefore, in the new academic year, the university dormitory located at 33 Ziyolilar Street, Mirzo Ulugbek district, will not accept students.

During the current academic year, only the newly constructed 6-story dormitory with a capacity of 400 beds, built in 2024 under a public-private partnership (PPP), will be operational. Its capacity has now been increased to 600 beds.

Allocation of places in the PPP-based dormitory is carried out based on the following priorities:

1. **Priority 1:** Students with disabilities, orphans, and those registered in the Unified Social Protection Register, Women's Register, and Youth Register;
2. **Priority 2:** Students residing far from their permanent place of residence;
3. **Priority 3:** Students without privileges whose place of residence is relatively close.

To date, more than 210 students have been accommodated in the dormitory.

In addition, efforts are underway to create a database of rental housing, assist students in finding accommodation through group tutors, and regularly publish information about newly available rental housing on the university's official website. This includes details such as address, landlord's name, contact number, and rental price.

The total demand for rental housing among university students amounts to 828. Of these, 602 second-, third-, and fourth-year students already have rental housing. For the remaining 226 students (mainly first-year students), a database of 69 rental housing units has been created across the Mirabad, Yashnabad, Yunusabad, Yakkasaray, and Sergeli districts, with a capacity to accommodate 312 students. The average rental cost ranges from 800,000 to 1,250,000 UZS per student. As of today, 64 first-year students have been accommodated in rental housing.

To ensure proper reception of students in the 2025/2026 academic year and to promptly address issues related to accommodation during the initial days of the academic year, the period from August 1 to September 10 of the current year has been declared as a "critical forty-day period." A hotline service (71 233 43 00) has also been launched.

Chairperson: It was emphasized that organizing meaningful leisure activities for students in dormitories, maintaining proper oversight of all students, enhancing the role of group tutors in assisting students with rental housing, and intensifying the publication of complete and up-to-date information about rental housing on the university's official website are essential requirements of today.

Based on the above information,

DECIDES:

1. The above information presented by the First Vice-Rector for Youth Affairs

and Spiritual-Educational Work, Q. Omonov, shall be accepted for implementation.

2. On September 2, students for the 2025/2026 academic year shall be properly welcomed at the university.

3. All students shall be promptly provided with accommodation by September 10, 2026.

HEARD:

Speaker: Sh. Mirziyatov

3. On determining the tuition fees for foreign citizens and students enrolled in joint educational programs

Vice-Rector for Finance and Economics, Sh. Mirziyatov, emphasized that for the new 2025/2026 academic year, the tuition fees for all local undergraduate and master's students have not been increased. He proposed that the tuition fees for foreign nationals studying at the university, as well as for students enrolled in joint educational programs, should not be raised, taking into account the current competitive environment in higher education. It was additionally noted that the tuition fees currently set for these students cover actual expenses.

Furthermore, Sh. Mirziyatov mentioned that, based on requests from representatives of several foreign countries and foreign citizens, a one-year master's program has been introduced at the university. In order to attract foreign investment, further develop education exports, and attract more international applicants to this program, it was recommended to set the tuition fee for the one-year program considering the competitive environment in education. It was noted that the tuition fee for foreign students currently enrolled in the two-year master's program is 18,975,000 UZS per year. Considering the completion of the curriculum within one year, the potential to attract more applicants, and the program's profitability, it was proposed to set the tuition fee for the one-year master's program for foreign students at one and a half times the current annual tuition, i.e., 28,462,500 UZS.

Subsequently, based on the proposals and suggestions presented above, the members of the Council unahimously approved the recommendations regarding the tuition fees for foreign nationals and students enrolled in joint educational programs, in the context of competition with rapidly developing state and non-state higher education institutions.

Based on the above, the University Council

DECIDES:

1. The report by Vice-rector for financial and economical affairs, Sh. Mirziyatov, is accepted for information.

2. The tuition fee for the one-year master's program shall be set at 28,462,500 (twenty-eight million four hundred sixty-two thousand five hundred) UZS per year for all specialties.

3. The tuition fees for foreign nationals and students enrolled in joint educational programs for the 2025/2026 academic year shall be established as follows:

HEARD:

Speaker: Sh.Mirziyatov

4. Extending the deadline for payment of tuition fees for the 2024/2025 academic year.

Vice-Rector for Finance and Economics, Sh. Mirziyatov, spoke and emphasized that, according to the University Council's 11th meeting held on June 28, 2025, students were allowed to pay 100% of their tuition fees before the official issuance of course-to-course transfer orders. Despite warnings to students and their parents, due to students' family circumstances, the practice of paying tuition fees in monthly installments, and other various reasons, it was reported that 142 students were unable to pay 100% of their tuition fees on time by August 28 and 30, 2025, when the course-to-course transfer orders were formalized. Considering the appeals from students and their parents, the large number of indebted students, the total amount owed, and the university's financial capacity, it had been decided to allow these students to complete their tuition payments.

As a result of explanatory work conducted with students and their parents, the number of students with unpaid tuition fees decreased from 315 as of June 28, 2025, to 142. In detail: 2 students owed amounts from 32,000 to 84,000 UZS, 14 students from 121,000 to 529,000 UZS, 14 students from 600,000 to 990,000 UZS, 16 students from 1,000,000 to 2,000,000 UZS, 27 students from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 UZS, 14 students from 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 UZS, 18 students from 4,000,000 to 5,000,000 UZS, 12 students from 5,000,000 to 6,000,000 UZS, 15 students from 6,000,000 to 7,000,000 UZS, 9 students from 7,300,000 to 11,000,000 UZS, and 1 student admitted under a tiered contract owed 26,200,000 UZS.

Taking into account the appeals of students and their parents, the students' interest in continuing their studies, and the necessity of supporting young people both financially and morally, it was emphasized that it is appropriate to provide another opportunity for students who have paid tuition fees after the deadline or who have not paid the full amount.

Following this, reports from institute directors and faculty deans were heard. They stated that institute directors and tutors were conducting explanatory work with each indebted student. Despite warnings to students and their parents, due to family

circumstances, installment payments, and other reasons, some students were unable to pay tuition fees on time. It was added that, as of today, the students who are in debt are mainly those facing financial difficulties. Furthermore, the directors and deans emphasized that allowing delayed tuition payments and providing students with an opportunity to clear their debts is appropriate, and this proposal was submitted for Council discussion.

Subsequently, the Council members unanimously approved, as an exception and within the authority granted to the university, the extension of the deadline for tuition fee payments to support students and their parents.

Based on the above, the University Council

DECIDES:

Taking into account the appeals of the majority of students, their parents, and the faculty deans:

1. The reports of the Vice-Rector for Finance and Economics, institute directors, and faculty deans are accepted for information.
2. For students studying on a tuition-contract basis, the payments for the 2024/2025 academic year made after the prescribed deadlines shall be accepted, and students shall be allowed to pay 100% of their tuition fees by October 20, 2025.

HEARD:

Speaker: D.Sayfullaev

5. On the discussion of projects prepared for submission to the competition announced by the Agency for Innovative Development for applied research and innovative projects conducted within the framework of state programs on scientific activities

Regarding the matter, Vice-Rector D. Sayfullaev, spoke:

– Within the framework of state programs on scientific activity aimed at implementing the tasks set out in the Presidential Decree PF-16 of January 30, 2025, on the “Uzbekistan – 2030” Strategy and the “State Program for Environmental Protection and Implementation of the Green Economy Year,” a competition for fundamental research has been announced. This competition targets social and humanitarian disciplines such as language and literature, history, archaeology, spirituality, culture, and arts, with a focus on generating scientific solutions. To participate in this competition, the research team of Tashkent State University of Oriental Studies has prepared a scientific project titled **“The Development of Secular Ideas in Central Asia during Various Historical Periods.”**

Within the scope of the project, the following activities are planned:

- Conduct a comprehensive anthropological analysis of the development of ethnobotanical knowledge in Central Asia in a socio-cultural context and its integration into modern scientific systems;

- Compile traditional knowledge of medicinal, dietary, and ceremonial plants passed down through generations, combining manuscript sources, oral traditions, and modern field data into a unified scientific information system;
- Develop a digital open-access database with a historical model of ethnobotanical knowledge, classification of knowledge networks, safety categories, and metadata compliant with international standards;
- Scientifically systematize traditional knowledge, document disappearing oral heritage, preserve it as cultural heritage, and make it accessible for research;
- Ensure safe information and communication in healthcare and public health, identify promising active components for pharmaceutical and bioeconomic applications;
- Create new educational modules in anthropology, botany, and ethnology, develop content for ethnobotanical gardens, interpretive trails, and local guides in sustainable tourism;
- Prepare scientific articles on the topic and publish them in local and international journals, including those indexed in Web of Science Core Collection and Scopus.

The Council members were then familiarized with the content of the proposed research projects (annexed). The research projects were put to a vote and were unanimously approved, with no opposing or abstaining votes.

Additionally, Vice-Rector Sayfullayev noted that the **“Science4State – 2025”** applied research competition, announced by the Agency for Innovative Development, is aimed at implementing the March 9, 2020, Resolution No. 133 of the Cabinet of Ministers on further improving the regulatory framework for scientific and innovative activities. To participate, the university’s scientific team prepared the following projects:

1. **“Askiya – Creating an Audiovisual Collection Related to the Art of Oratory”**
 - Systematize existing and newly collected materials on the Askiya art of oratory and create a complex audiovisual archive in digital form;
 - Produce scholarly publications, multimedia guides, and albums highlighting the historical roots, social functions, and aesthetic value of Askiya;
 - Apply innovative technologies and modern educational methods to digitally preserve cultural heritage and integrate it into research and education in the arts;
 - Compile examples of Askiya based on written sources, archival materials, audio and video recordings;
 - Conduct interviews with contemporary Askiya performers, folklorists, and cultural scholars to gather empirical material;
 - Conduct comparative analysis of oratory arts among different peoples to scientifically substantiate its uniqueness;
 - Prepare scientific articles for local and international journals, including Web of Science and Scopus-indexed publications.

2. **“Study, Digitization, and Facsimile Creation of the Manuscript ‘Kitob at-Tawhid’ at the University of Cambridge”**

- High-resolution scanning of the manuscript and creation of a digital archive;
- Produce a facsimile edition as close as possible to the original for scientific institutions and libraries;
- Conduct codicological and philological analysis, including paper, ink, writing style, and textual variants;
- Study the religious-philosophical foundations of Imam Maturidi’s teachings and relate them to contemporary social and philosophical issues;
- Develop social-educational materials to promote Maturidi ideas of tolerance and moderation via media and digital platforms;
- Publish scientific articles in local and international journals, including Web of Science and Scopus-indexed publications.

3. **“Translation of Alisher Navoi’s ‘Khamsa’ into English and Creation of a Parallel Corpus-Based Electronic Platform”**

- Select reliable critical texts of Navoi’s Khamsa poems and prepare them in electronic form;
- Develop and apply transliteration standards from Arabic-Persian script to Latin;
- Translate the poems into English with scholarly rigor, involve foreign specialists in editing and preparing for publication;
- Create bilingual dictionaries (Uzbek–English) and integrate them into the platform;
- Develop digital illustrations corresponding to the plot, combining national and global miniature traditions;
- Test and integrate the project results into the educational process and make them publicly accessible;
- Publish scientific articles in journals indexed in Web of Science and Scopus.

4. **Applied Research in Economics under “Science4State – 2025”**

- PhD student M.X. Vokhidova prepared a project titled “Development of Organizational-Economic Mechanisms for Managing Industrial Enterprises in Bektemir District, Tashkent, under Green Economy and Sustainable Development Conditions.”

5. **Digital Platform “energoatama.uz”**

- PhD Nuriddinov Nodir Nurmat prepared a project to create a multilingual electronic platform, publishing a glossary of terms in Uzbek, Russian, English, Persian, Dari, and Pashto covering all directions in the energy sector.

The Council members were familiarized with the content of the proposed research projects (annexed). The projects were put to a vote and were unanimously approved, with no opposing or abstaining votes.

DECIDES:
